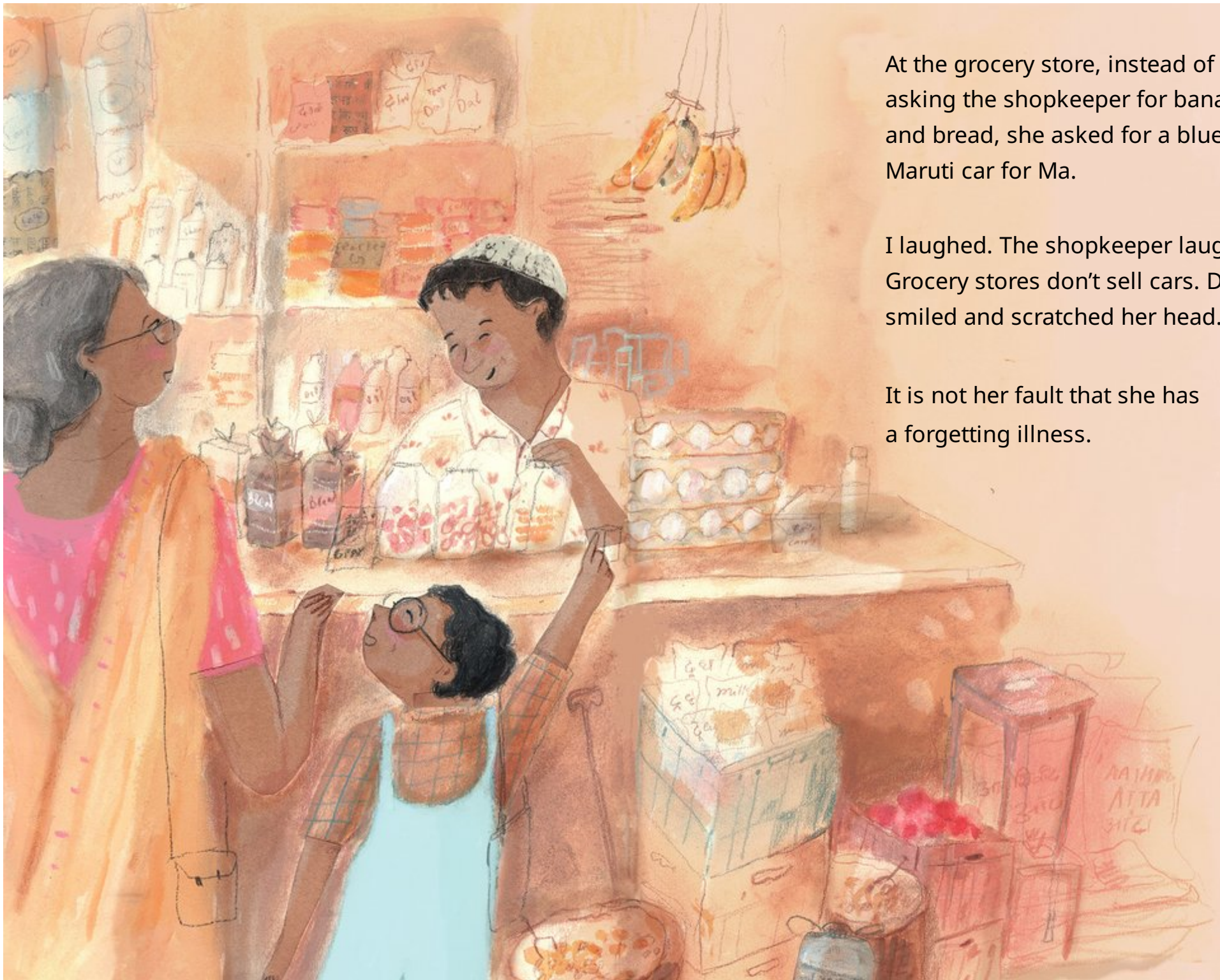
Dida forgets everything.

Like yesterday, when Dida asked Ma what her name was. Ma shook her head and looked at her feet.

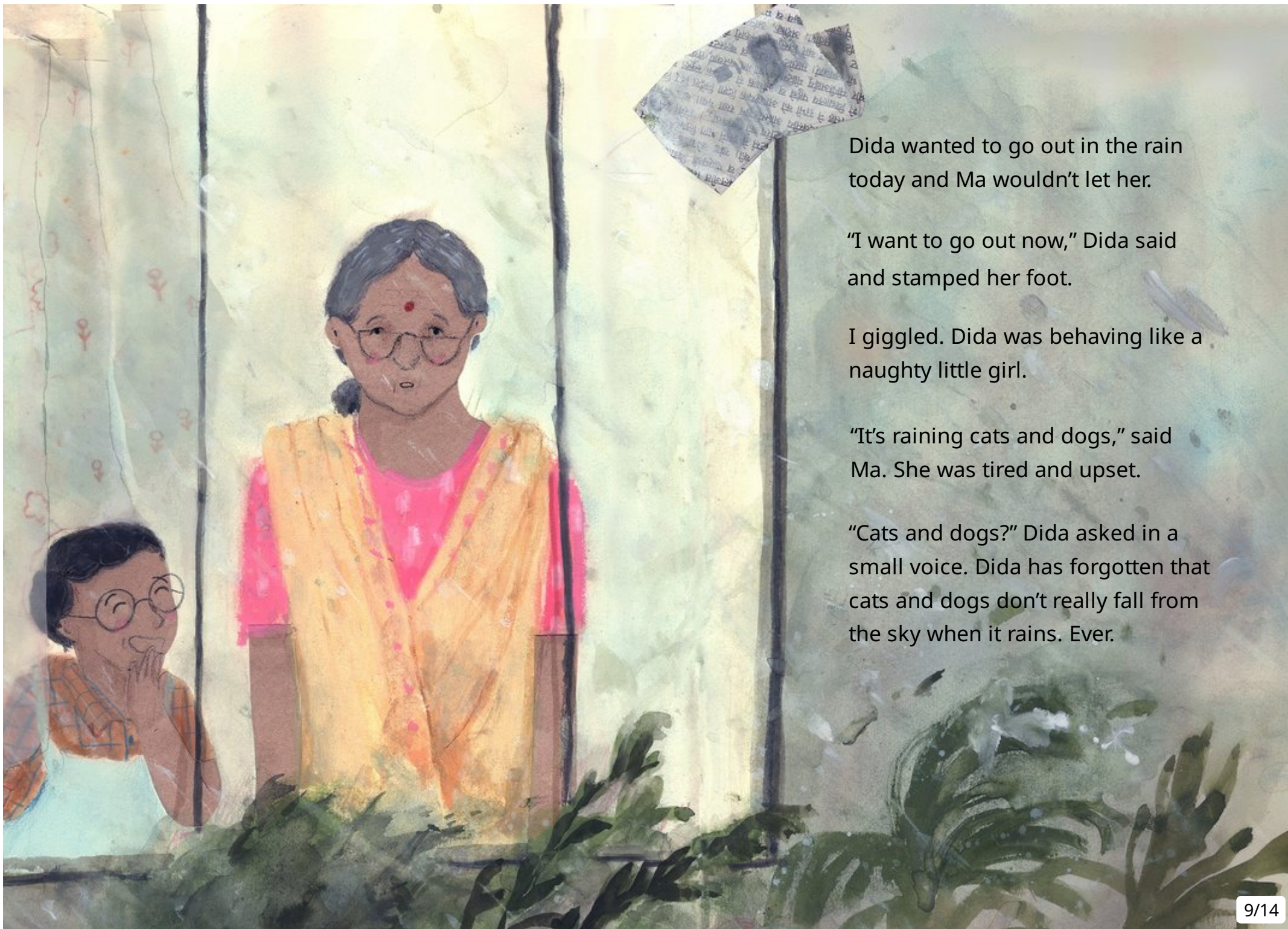
“Don’t be funny, Dida,” I said. “She is your daughter. How could you forget her name?”

Dida wanted to go out in the rain today and Ma wouldn't let her.

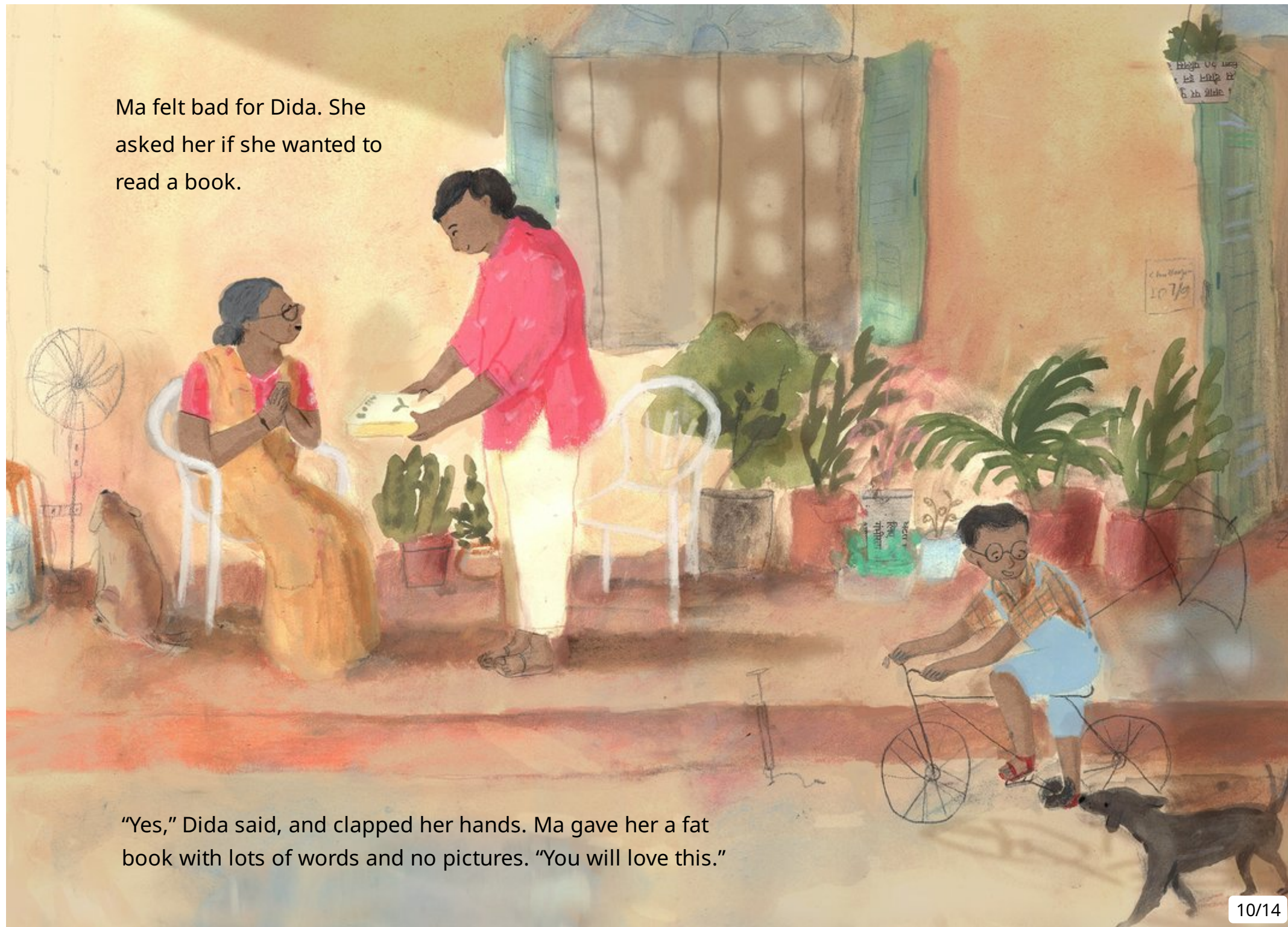
"I want to go out now," Dida said and stamped her foot.
