- Reflect on how gender and racial biases affect opportunities.
- Be inspired to pursue their own passions, no matter the barriers.
- Identify values like perseverance, determination, and fairness.

Lesson plan

Explore the power of pursuing dreams despite societal bias. Discuss how children today can stand up for fairness and follow their dreams.

Learning Outcome

Before Reading:

- What sport or hobby do you love?
- Have you ever been told you couldn’t do something because of who you are?

During Reading :

- What does Marcenia do that surprises the boys?
- Why do people think she shouldn’t play baseball?
- How does she prove them wrong?

After Reading–

- What obstacles did Marcenia face?
- How did she respond to people who doubted her?
- How can you stand up for your dreams?
- Can you think of other ways people are treated unfairly because of gender, race, disability?

- Courage Chain
- Dream Poster
- “Catch Your Dream” Glove

Expected Outcomes

Children will:

- Understand how biases around gender, race, and ability affect opportunity.
- Reflect on their own potential to push past barriers.
- Be motivated by stories of real-life changemakers.
- Recognize the importance of equity and the role of perseverance.
