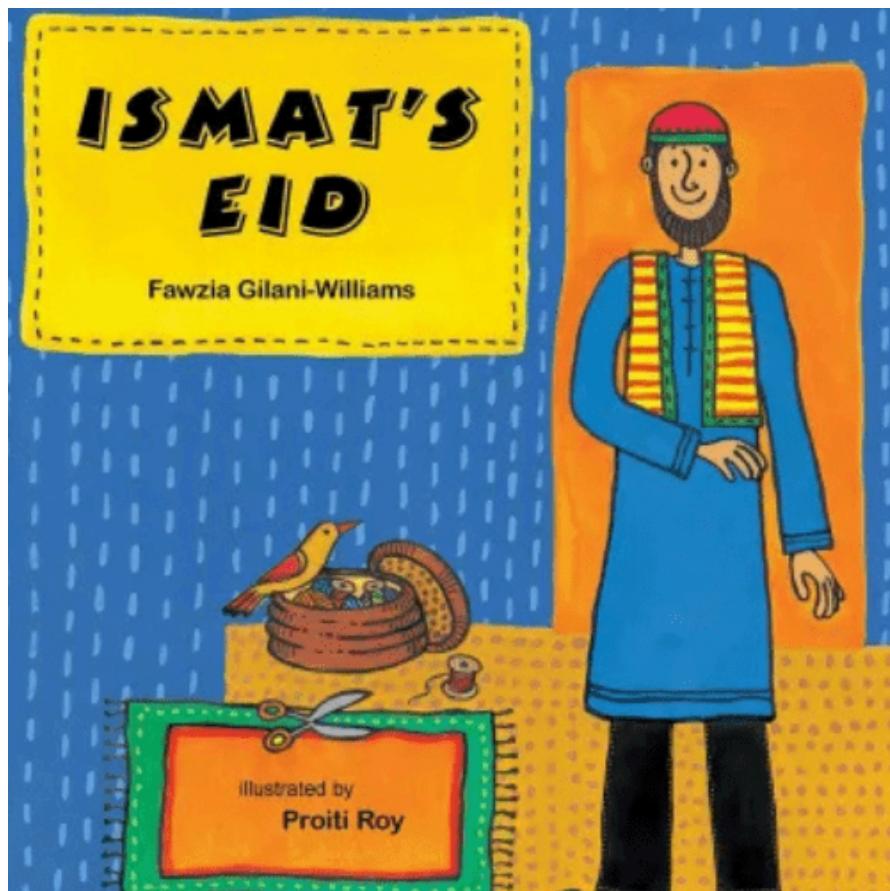


# Ismat's Eid

# Story Discussion Guide

- Explore family traditions and cultural celebrations from around the world.
- Appreciate the spirit of Eid and universal festival values.
- Recognize shared human experiences of humor and generosity.

## Lesson plan

Festival outfit mix-up, reflections on family celebrations, and a hands-on patch-the-pants craft that blends humor with learning.

## Learning Outcome

### Before Reading:

- What do you know about Eid? How do people celebrate it?
- Which festivals do you celebrate with your family? What do you enjoy most?

### During Reading :

- What does Ismat want to do for his family?
- What problem does he face with his trousers?
- What does each family member try to do, and why keep it secret?

### After Reading-

- What went wrong—and what went right?
- How does the story show that all families like to surprise and care for each other?
- Regardless of place or belief, don't we all love to laugh, care and share as we celebrate our festivals?

## Activities:

- Festival Outfit Mix-Up (Art & Drama): Design a traditional outfit, then let peers secretly alter parts. Reveal for classroom laughter and discussion.
- My Family's Festival Traditions (Writing/Drawing): Illustrate or write about how you celebrate your favorite festival with family.
- Patch the Pants (Math + Art): Provide paper trouser cut-outs; measure, cut, and reattach patches creatively, introducing basic measurement skills.

## Expected Outcomes

- Broaden understanding of festivals across cultures.
- Reflect on humor and kindness as universal experiences.
- Recognize family love in diverse traditions.
- Learn about Eid's values of sharing and caring, with family and the underprivileged.
