Learning Outcome

Before Reading:

- What's your favorite story from your grandparents or elders?
- What food or drink reminds you of home?
- Have you ever written down or drawn a family memory?

During Reading :

- Why does Amiya want a library?
- What do you think noon chai symbolizes in this story?
- What feelings does Deidi carry from her past?
- How do grandparents pass on culture even without books?

Activities:

- Students draw a teacup and write one memory, story, or tradition from a family member inside it.
