Story Discussion Guide

- Understand the importance of sharing in friendships and family relationships.
- Reflect on how acts of kindness strengthen emotional bonds.
- Appreciate how food connects us to culture, memory, and each other.
- Recognize that generosity is a universal value.
- Express their own stories of giving and empathy through creative activities.
- Reinforce the idea that 'whether you live in India, or anywhere else, sharing brings people closer— everywhere in the world.'

Lesson plan

Learning Outcome

Before Reading:

- Have you ever wanted something so much that you didn't want to share it?
- How did it feel when you shared—or didn't?
- Write their responses on the board under: "What happens when we share?"

During Reading :

- What does the story teach us about friendship?
- Why were the girls so excited for the mango?
- Why did Suma want to keep the mango to herself? How did she feel afterward?

After Reading:

- Have you ever wanted to keep something just for yourself?
- What do you think made Suma cry?
- Why is sharing important in friendships?

Activities:

- : Students draw a picture of themselves sharing something special.
- Inside a mango shape, write what they shared and how it made them feel.
- Display the mangoes on a classroom tree titled: “Our Sweetest Moments.”
