


# A Fish and a Gift

# Story Discussion Guide

## Learning Outcome

- Understand livelihoods linked to natural resources like the ocean.
- Appreciate parental love and sacrifice.
- Learn about fishing as a profession and its risks.
- Reflect on how families show love differently.

### Before Reading:

- Do you know anyone whose job takes them away from home?
- What kinds of jobs exist in your community?

### During Reading:

- What work does Yusuf's father do?
- How does Yusuf feel when his father is away?

### After Reading:

- Why does his father bring sea gifts?
- What challenges do fishermen face?

## Activities :

- Draw a gift you would bring from the sea.
- Role Play different community jobs.
- Story Extension: Write about a special handmade or found gift.

## Expected Outcomes

- Awareness of how livelihood affects family life.
- Appreciation for acts of love in families.
- Connection between environment and livelihoods.
- Value of storytelling across generations.
